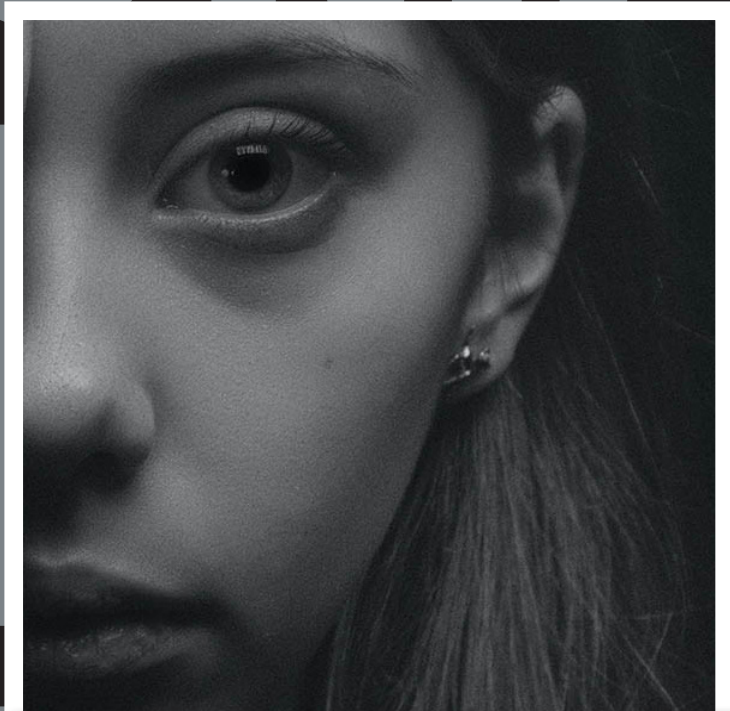

HUMAN TRAFFICKING IS SLAVERY

RESOURCE GUIDE

Human trafficking is slavery. It's the illegal trade of human beings. It's the recruitment, control, and use of people for their bodies and for their labor, through force, fraud, and coercion. People everywhere are being bought and sold against their will – right now in the 21st century.

Human trafficking can take different forms, such as forced labor, sex trafficking, organ trafficking, child soldier, child marriage and debt bondage. There are 40.3 million people currently enslaved around the world. Statistics say that 71% of them are women, 29% men, and 25% are children. It is a \$150 billion dollar industry and is the fastest-growing criminal industry in the world.

Traffickers don't fit just one stereotype and aren't necessarily strangers to their victims. These exploiters have been found to be family members, peers, romantic partners, educators, employers, community leaders, and clergy.

ACGC's Department of Women's Ministries is seeking to raise awareness and encourage our ministries to get involved in the fight against human trafficking. Engaging in education, supporting prevention initiatives and victim care can bring hope and relief.

We will soon provide education and material with pertinent information, facts and statistics about human trafficking. In this booklet, you will find a list of reputable organizations in the U.S. that are making an on-going and positive impact nationally and globally and that have been found to be fiscally responsible. LOCAL AND NATIONAL

The Wellhouse (Odenville, AL) www.The-wellhouse.org - provides residential, therapeutic programs to female victims of human trafficking who have been sexually exploited, offering medical, spiritual, mental, and emotional care.

4theONE Foundation (Denton, TX) www.4theone.org - is dedicated to the location and recovery of missing and exploited teens.

Refuge For Women (Lexington, KY) www.refugeforwomen.org - provides specialized long-term care for women who have escaped human trafficking or sexual exploitation. With multiple locations across the U.S., Refuge for Women offers up to twelve months of safe housing, at no charge to the resident, with around the clock care as clients progress through evidence-based, trauma-informed programming.

Let My People Go (Chicago, IL) www.lmpg.org - dedicated to building a network of well-equipped churches capable of loving those most vulnerable in their churches and communities. Practically, this "love" is evidenced throughout the congregation as the church identifies, empowers, protects, and includes those who traffickers would normally target.

The Wellhouse website is also home to their on-line shop where supporters can purchase handmade jewelry made by survivors. Purchases directly benefit this organization's fight against sex trafficking.

Poiema Foundation (Rockwall, TX) www.poiemafoundation.org - educates the public and raises awareness in order to prevent sexual abuse, sex trafficking, and other methods of sexual exploitation. We also facilitate the restoration journey of survivors by providing for their physical, psychological, emotional, and spiritual needs.

Thistle Farms (Nashville, TN) www.thistlefarms.org - dedicated to helping women survivors recover and heal from prostitution, trafficking, and addiction by providing a safe place to live, a meaningful job, and a lifelong sisterhood of support.

Street Grace (Norcross, GA) www.street-grace.org - a faith-driven organization collaborating with faith, business and community leaders providing a comprehensive path to end the sexual exploitation of minors.

A21 (Santa Ana, CA) www.A21.org - driven by a radical hope that the tragic cycle of human trafficking can be broken by reaching (education & awareness), rescuing (partnering with authorities to secure the freedom of victims and the conviction of human traffickers), and restoring (empowering survivors of human trafficking on their unique journey toward restoration and independence).

International Justice Mission (Washington, DC) www.ijm.org - IJM rescues children, women and men by disrupting the slave trade. At IJM, they work with local governments to rescue victims and throw their oppressors in jail.

Agape International Missions (Roseville, CA) www.aimfree.org - to rescue, restore, and reintegrate survivors of sex trafficking through Christ's love and Gospel. To prevent sex trafficking by protecting, equipping and empowering vulnerable and exploited communities, reducing demand and equipping the local church to do the same worldwide.

Hope For Justice (Nashville, TN) www.hopeforjustice.org - Hope for Justice exists to bring an end to modern slavery by preventing exploitation, rescuing victims, restoring lives, and reforming society.

Shared Hope International (Vancouver, WA) www.sharedhope.org - dedicated to bringing an end to sex trafficking through our three-pronged approach – prevent, restore, and bring justice.

First, they are proactive. This foundation believes that the implementation of programs designed to preserve and strengthen a healthy family unit is key to lowering the trend. Secondly, they are reactive. Working in conjunction with rescue organizations on the front lines, they are actively involved in the literal rescue of those who are enslaved. And finally, they are committed to supporting the survivors' long-term recovery through relationship by providing them with comprehensive resources needed for healing, including sharing with them the life-changing message of the Gospel, so they may overcome the vicious trauma and abuse they have suffered.
