**Report of the
NATIONAL PRESIDENT
Woman's Home and Foreign Mission Society
August 2026**

“A Tiny Seed, A Powerful Deed.” Who would have thought this year’s Devotional Guide would be so thought provoking and inspirational? From the creation story in Genesis to the oil poured on Jesus’s feet, we are reminded that God can and does take the small things to cause his kingdom grow in a big way. Does this apply to us today? Some of our groups are very small. Some of our conferences have but a few churches. Yet our work continues and we see God’s Word being shared across the globe. In this report I am privileged to share with you how our tiny seeds are indeed, through our Father’s love, producing powerful deeds.

Mission Travel Fund

Last year we were made aware that Tanzanian pastors Amos Komanya and Johnson Odoyo had been invited to attend our Triennial meeting at Ridgecrest. One concern was the amount of money needed to bring these men to the United States. Our WHFMS groups took on the project of raising the estimated \$8,000 needed for this venture. We had until April 2026 to raise the funds. I have to admit; I was a little concerned that this might be asking too much from our groups. There was no need for me to be worried. Just like the Israelites in Exodus 36: 36-38 our groups gave more than was needed and had to be told to stop giving. Tiny seed-powerful deed.

Bread of Life

We began the Bread of Life project in 2016 after a very successful “Bicycles for Pastors” endeavor. There are many people in our mission fields who are very poor. Often these people exist on less than what we would consider one meal a day. Our missionaries are working to bring the Word of God to these areas, but when someone is hungry, their need for food is primary. Since we began this project, we have reached or exceeded our goal almost every year. In fact, from 2016 through 2025 our members have given \$135,306.08! As we always do, let’s do the math. Since \$70 feeds approximately 100 people one meal, our giving from 2016-2025 provided around 193,200 meals. This is while they are learning about the love of God and the true Bread of Life, Jesus Christ. Tiny seed-powerful deed.

Human Trafficking Awareness

Sometimes it is easy to become discouraged. The evil of human trafficking for sex, labor and criminal acts is almost as old as time itself. When we read the statistics and see the faces of the survivors, we feel hopeless. When we began the project of human trafficking awareness, our goal was, and continues to be, to promote an understanding of what human trafficking is, where it is happening and what we can do to support groups who fight this and provide safety for survivors. This goal is very hard to measure. However, we do know from reading the reports of our local WHFMS groups that this information is being discussed. Training is being provided and donations are often given to trusted agencies. We know that the horror of this sin will continue until our Lord returns, but we cannot quit doing our part. Perhaps just one person will learn something and that one person will share with another who has an idea about what can be done in a community and one person who is being trafficked will find this support and be rescued. While to us that would be just one person, to that one person it is their entire life. The Lord’s command to love others is never completed. Let us not become discouraged in the fight. Tiny seed-powerful deed.

WHFMS Update

Our WHFMS Update is currently going out to over 400 addresses and has an open rate of around 54%. We have found this to be a highly effective tool for sharing needs, information and encouragement to our members. Through the Update our members learned of the need for funds for mission travel, how Bread of Life was progressing and many other things and they responded as only our WHFMS women can do. Writing this Update is overall the most time-consuming task of my role as national president. There are times when it becomes frustrating to get information or pictures, or even the articles. But just at that time I get a call from a local with the question “Would you like these pictures?” or “Would you tell us more about this?” and writing it becomes a joy again. As the new president takes office, I encourage you to be supportive. Read the Update, send in ideas and pictures and volunteer to write articles. Tiny seed-powerful deed.

Devotional Guide

I have already discussed the 2026 Devotional Guide at length. But I must express my appreciation to the Southern Region and especially to Cynthia Lee, Southern Region president, for all of their work in writing this guide. They worked for many months to perfect this product, and it shows. Do not forget the opportunity you have to present Gaye Martin, a professional speaker to your church on Women’s Sunday via YouTube. Her message entitled, “Such As I Have,” is a blessing and will be appreciated by the people in the congregations. Our Devotional Guide is small compared to many biblical texts and devotionals written by many prominent people, but its effects are felt throughout our WHFMS groups and denomination. It promotes a sense of community within our group and continuity. Tiny seed-powerful deed.

Triennial Meeting

The year leading up to Triennial is an especially busy time. There are many details to consider and people to contact. I believe our speaker Kristi Libby will give us an encouraging and inspirational message.

We were so happy to have raised the needed funds for Johnson Odoyo and Amos Komanya to come to Triennial well ahead of schedule. Thank you for your generous giving. However, we were truly disappointed when their visas were denied due to the Presidential Proclamation. We will continue to pray for their work and are pleased to know the funds raised will further their ministry.

The business meeting will be an important time with election of officers, voting on constitutional amendments and other concerns. This will be my last triennial as your president, and it is bittersweet for me. I am looking forward to this time with our members from so many places.

Miscellaneous

As with all reports there are some topics that do not fall neatly into a category. I am so appreciative of the people at ACGC. Our executive director, Rev. Justin Nash, is committed to supporting the work of WHFMS and making it part of the overall work of our denomination. He is always available and is truly concerned about our organization. Rev. Jeff Walsh, international missions director, bears the weight of our mission work with such compassion and skill. He responds to my many questions and is willing to share information and to discuss ideas for our work. Faye Richards, WHFMS coordinator, is a joy and a blessing. Dawn Rutan’s quick responses, financial acumen and love for our Lord are so encouraging. Cara Brock makes our Devotional Guides and the WHFMS Update look professional, and her creativity is a pleasure to see. Meredith Broadway brings a perfectionism to our products, and that is so appreciated. Working with the national WHFMS board through the past 12 years as the president, and before that for several years as the Appalachian Region president, has given me such the unique opportunity to get to know women from across our denomination who love our Lord, missions and each other. I am

so thankful for the time I had with them. They have been so supportive, they have provided a listening ear, given advice and have laughed with me so much at just the right time. Truly they are my “sisters in Christ.”

Finally

Our WHFMS has a rich history. We began 123 years ago and have supported countless missionaries, mission work and projects. We have helped to sustain many churches and community organizations. We have prayed together, worked together, rejoiced together, cried together and laughed together. We have been and continue to be blessed in many ways through the work the Lord has entrusted us to do. As your new president begins her term, I encourage you to pray for her and follow her leading.

We know without a doubt that we can say as Paul said in Philippians 1:6 “Being confident of this, that he who began a good work in you will carry it one to completion until the day of Christ Jesus.” And we say, “Maranatha!”

**Report of the
NATIONAL VICE PRESIDENT

What an honor to be writing this report on behalf of our vice president, Cheryl Harris. Cheryl has served brilliantly in the position of national vice president since 2005. Her love for our Lord and his kingdom work has been evident in every program kit she has led. Her great joy in serving WHFMS as the national vice president has shown through absolutely everything she has done. Cheryl's smile in the middle of long board meetings, when we were all tired and maybe a little discouraged, was ever-present.

Cheryl's health has deteriorated significantly over the past several years. Beginning in 2020 she has had more difficulty doing this job she loves, but she did not give up. She continued working through and has maintained her contagious enthusiasm for the work of WHFMS and the Program Kit in particular. However, she recently has had more illnesses and had to resign from this position at the end of March 2026 so that she could focus on doing what she needs to do to get better.

Cheryl has produced at least 21 Program Kits, working with the different regions in turn. She has worked with countless authors, editing their work and bringing out the best in them. When asked her favorite Program Kit, she could not answer, because each of them was written at the time they were needed and with such care. Each year, as soon as one Program Kit was completed the next year's one was already in process. Being responsible for the Program Kits, now called Devotional Guides, was a constant cycle of choosing a theme, working through the details with the other people on that year's committee and then seeking the writers, reminding, editing, rewriting and, often at the last minute, personally writing the devotionals that were promised but not submitted.

The kits have ranged from Scripture verses, prayer topics, songs of faith, evangelism and many others. Each have provided a way for our groups to share a common theme, a purpose and a sense of community. Cheryl's introduction to the 2016 kit, Piece'ful Living, based on quilts, is a beautiful example of her work and heart:

Our theme Scripture for Piece'ful Living is found in John 14:27. "Peace I leave with you, my peace I give you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not be afraid." The peace provides comfort, joy, happiness and safety. We love hearing about how that peace has been true from generation to generation. We wrap ourselves in that peace during times of fear, illness and loss. We know that peace will see us throughout this life and into eternity.

Cheryl was not able to write this report; however, we know from her many years of service to WHFMS and especially her demonstrated faith and love for the Lord, that she is "wrapping ... in that peace." We are so thankful for her work, we appreciate her creativity and we are joining with her in prayer for her healing so she can continue to serve our Lord. She is a dear friend and treasure.

These ladies bring a heart for missions to their meetings. From the annual local WHFMS reports submitted for our region in 2025, we had 18 circles reporting, representing 163 members. Financial giving over the past three years in reports totaled \$211,486.35. I praise God for this sacrificial giving to our denomination, regional and conference camps and to many other ministry points that are precious to them.

In the past two years, I have been able to attend meetings that include the Piedmont and Pocahontas conference meetings. Plans are underway for connecting with the ladies of the West Virginia conference. I have also attended the summer meetings for the region. In addition to meetings, I attended the fall women's retreat at Blowing Rock both years. I have also coordinated our board meetings in person in the summer and via Zoom in the spring.

Plans for our August 1 meeting are in progress. I look forward to meeting with the board members via Zoom as we move forward.

The Tea Party guide will take us through the organization and preparation, the fellowship and the clean-up of a tea party. CENTRAL REGION
Woman's Home and Foreign Mission Society
August 2026**

I am excited to say the Central Region WHFMS is back on track, we are receiving all WHFMS news and important information from Karen Hall and ACGC. Each group is doing well as follows:

Brays Missouri has 10 members. Their focus is on fellowship and supporting missions both local and global. Their activities include attending women's conferences and craft nights, hosting a women's breakfast and other events. Locally, they care for widows and visit shut-ins. They meet regularly and raise money for ACGC Missions.

Magnolia, Wisconsin has eight members. They give to United Ministries, Bread of Life, Christmas in October, World Hunger and First Responders, along with three other local charities. They use the Program Kit, do a devotional regularly at their meetings and are involved in community projects. They hold regular meetings.

There are three Illinois groups.

DeKalb has eight members. They are currently giving to United Ministries and Bread of Life. They also give to four other local charities. They use the Program Kit and meet regularly.

La Grange has 13 members. They give to four or five charities at the end of the year. Some of the fundraisers they do are "Soup and Such" and "Quilt Day." They also have secret pals and a December Christmas outing. They use the Program Kit. They host regular meetings and take the summers off.

Prophetstown has 20 members. They give to Penny Crusade, Christmas in October, United Ministries and First Responders. They do summer lunches for children, music and devotionals for local nursing homes, card ministries for birthday and anniversaries, Trunk or Treat, Women's Sunday, host game nights and they attend women's retreats and conferences. They are also prayer partners and use the Program Kit.

There are three Ohio groups.

Claiborne has nine members, however, three have health issues. They have goals to visit shut-ins. They do monthly meetings, missionary work and pray for needs. They give to United Ministries, Bread of Life as well as local giving. They use the Program Kit.

Rockbridge is a brand-new group with 10-12 members! They do fundraisers so they can give to Penny Crusade, Christmas in October, Samaritan's Purse (50 shoe boxes), winter hats and gloves for local bus drivers to give out to those in need. They give funds to their community and use the Program Kit.

Willow Grove has grown from six to 10 members and is still growing. They do fundraisers so they can give to Penny Crusade, United Ministries, Bread of Life, Christmas in October, 12 local charities and to Samaritan's Purse. They meet monthly and use the Program Kit.

The three Ohio groups get together twice a year in the Spring and Fall. They have a carry in lunch and invite guest speakers. They have a wonderful time together with their sisters from other churches.

This Spring their special speaker was Kristin Pappas, the author of “Widow for a Season: Finding Your Identity in Christ.” This book is a great read and has valuable information for everyone. They have had seven women read it and have learned from it. At the meeting, Kristin spoke about the experience she and her new husband had the 12 years they lived in Greece. There they started a quilt shop to help women who had been trafficked get a start on a new life. She brought a few quilts that the women had made. She shared a devotion from 1st and 2nd Thessalonians referencing Macedonia and Achaia, which were close to their shop. Kristin also gave the group references on state and local places to help fight human trafficking.

I am very thankful to all the Central Region groups for allowing me to be their president. I have met a lot of great and helpful people on my journey. I hope to continue to serve you.

During the past three years, it has been my pleasure and privilege to represent our societies at two advisory board meetings held at Advent Christian Village. I have also been part of some Zoom meetings.

But the more I think about it, I strive to be more like Mary. To sit at the feet of Jesus and reflect on what he is teaching me. I'm a work in progress.

It has been an extremely busy year, I teach the senior high Sunday school class, and junior church most Sundays. We have children that only come to church, and we are able to introduce Jesus to them. Children's Heart trips, church activities, family commitments. Some days it's like taking a breath and trying to keep up. Yet I try to find time daily to sit at his feet.

I had spring and fall trips to Uganda. I love the families I medically transport. Many have such limited knowledge of Jesus, and we are honored to be his hands and feet. I also work with a small children's home and am so privileged to bring supplies to our friends.

Once March hit (it really is March Madness!), I attended the Florida Conference that brings an opportunity to reconnect with friends around the conference. Easter preparations. The Saturday before Easter we have an egg hunt, but always sprinkle it with the Easter Story for the kids that come. Craft fair in April, and again, we share with those that attend. I have a free craft table to those who want to drop their kids off while they shop around. The same families return every sale, and the kids ask what we are doing this time? These are kids we may only see twice a year, but try to share the love of Jesus with them.

Onward to May and our Penny Crusade. This involves the entire church. Meanwhile we begin to prep for our VBS. VBS is always important, no matter how many children we have, we work hard to have a successful program each year. This year's mission project was to collect school supplies. We had quite a bit of left over banners and decorations; God gave us a little Haitian church in Tampa with whom to share our decorations.

I was greatly humbled to be asked to be camp nurse for junior camp at Suwannee this past year. This was a rough camp in many ways, but there was definitely a spiritual battle. God overcame! Those of us that went through the fire came out with a newfound strength in our own lives. Please continue to pray for our youth camps, not only during the camps but throughout the year. I was not able to attend the national board meeting due to not being able to leave the campground for the meeting.

We held a “Back to School” rally, giving away backpacks and school supplies to children from the neighborhood elementary schools. Although the turnout wasn't as great as we had hoped, we made new contacts and the remainder of our supplies went to the little orphanage in Uganda and our Christmas shoeboxes. We were able to fill out boxes with so many goodies this year!

We also held a First Responders breakfast for the first part of September. We will continue this ministry in the future.

September brought the Florida Conference's Women's Retreat. We had a wonderful time of fellowship, studying God's Word, fun and games and craft projects, plus the food! Oh my, do we have great cooks in Florida!

In October, another trip to Uganda from the Cayman Islands with a teenage young man and his mom. The family is Muslim, and at the time had not accepted Jesus. We had a stop in Atlanta and was able to reunite with a dear Christian sister who always goes the extra mile with her hospitality and love of Jesus. She was able to furnish the family with clothing and supplies for their homes in Uganda. The mom and son are now believers, and we continue to pray for the dad and other family members to meet Jesus.

I know that prayer was working mightily on this trip. When entering Uganda, the officials informed me that my Visa had expired and needed another one before entering the country. Not to worry, I could obtain one at the airport. Nothing seemed to be working. The machine would not accept my credit card, I had to pay cash (which just happened to be the amount my friend in Atlanta had placed in my hand before we flew). The next machine would not print a viable Visa for my passport. The woman, who barely spoke English, scribbled on the edge of a piece of paper, tore it off, and took it to the counter. They stamped it and said, "You're good!" I honestly thought I would have to explain it when I left the country, but they just waved me through! God is Good!

I attended the Medical Mission's conference virtually from Louisville this year. I missed attending with everyone, but was able to take more workshops by computer than if I had attended in person.

We went to Massachusetts for Thanksgiving, and then on to the Christmas rush.

Please continue to pray for one another. We may be the encouragement that someone needs today.

But in your hearts regard Christ the Lord as holy, ready at any time to give a defense to anyone who asks you for a reason for the hope that is in you. Yet do this with gentleness and reverence, keeping a clear conscience, so that when you are accused, those who disparage your good conduct in Christ will be put to shame. 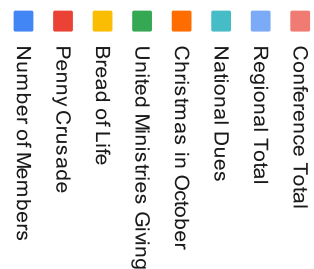
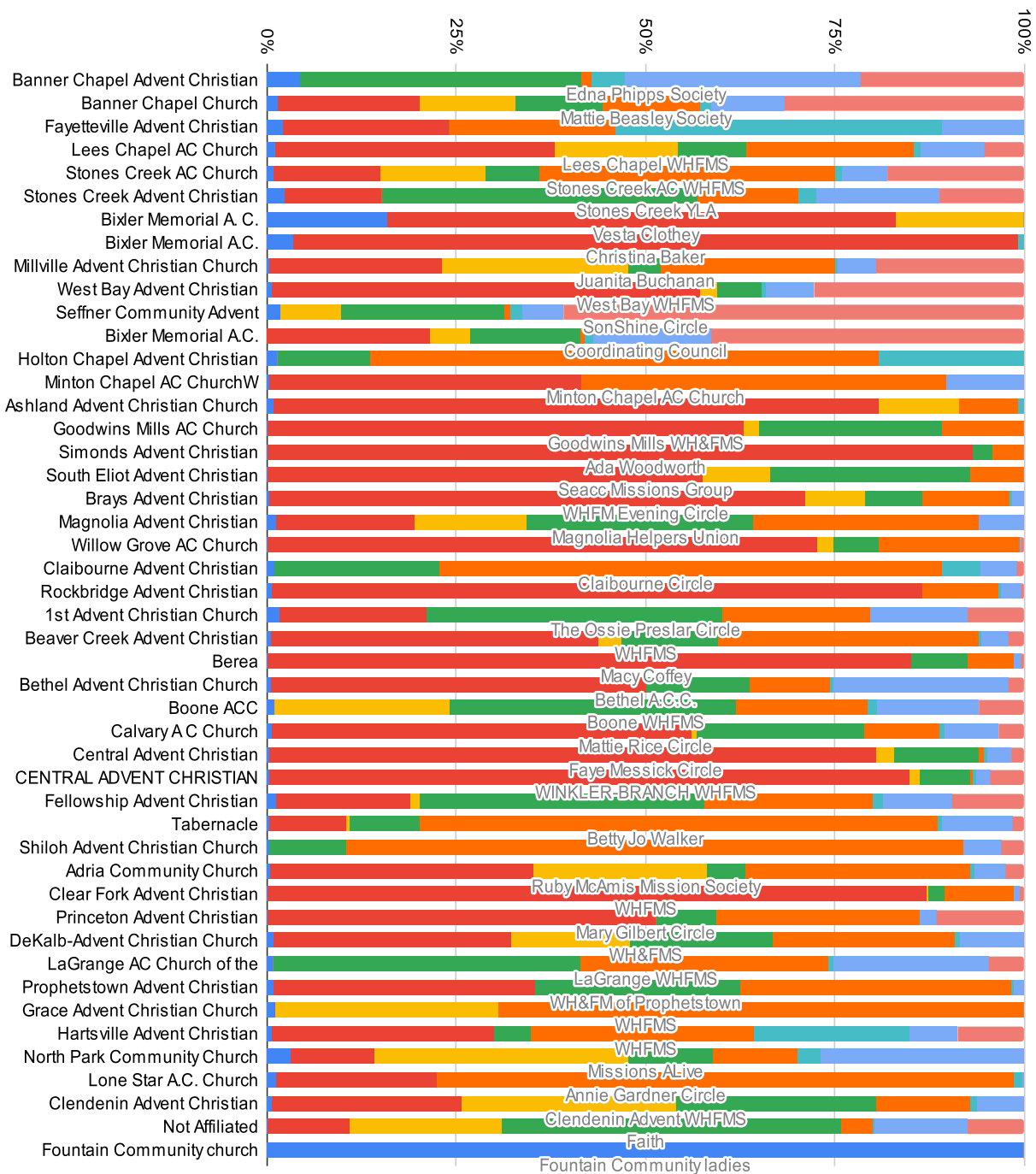
It is my joy to serve as WHFMS Coordinator, and I look forward to seeing what God does through WHFMS in the future until his return.

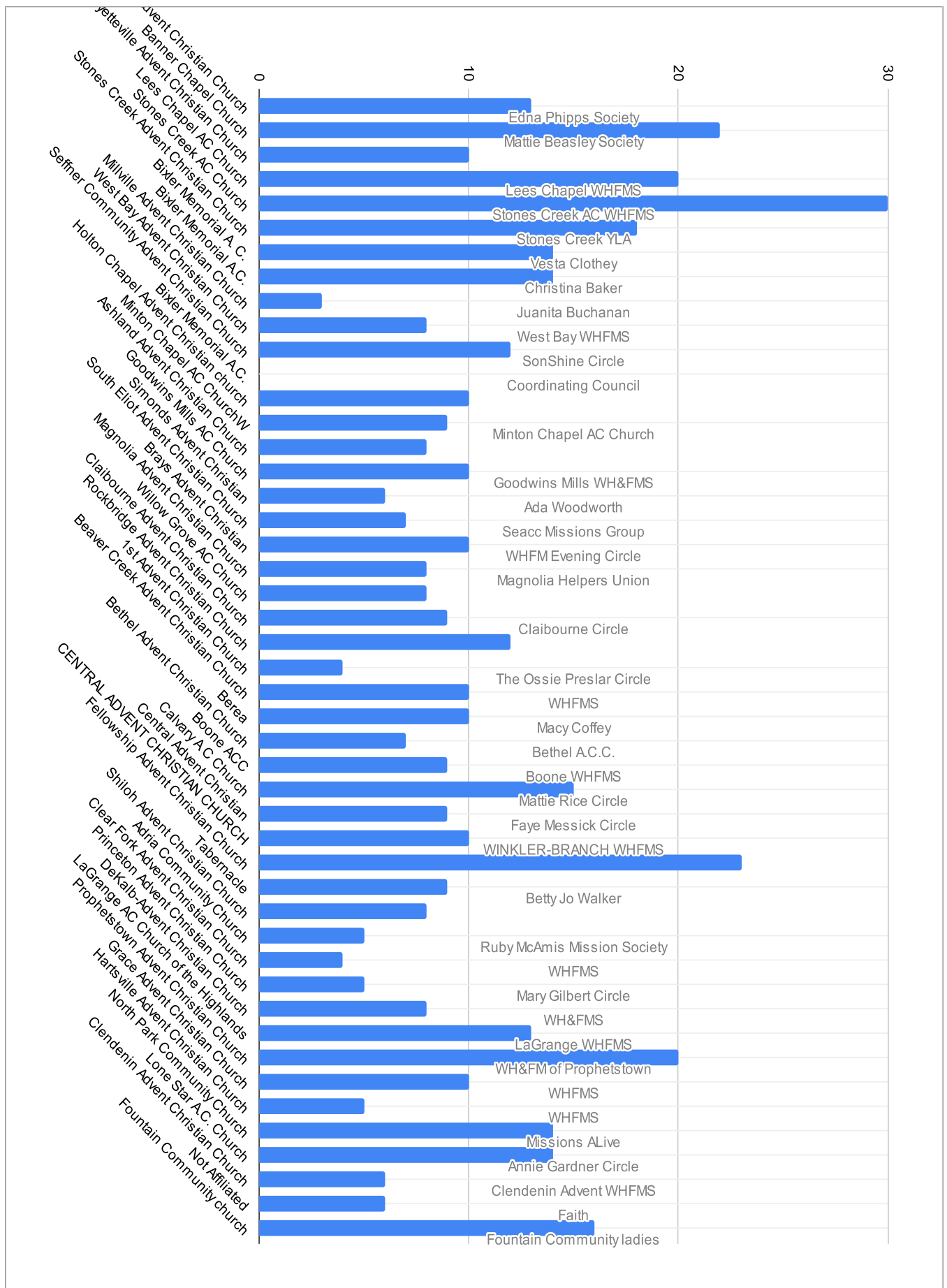

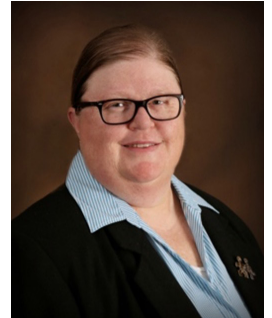
